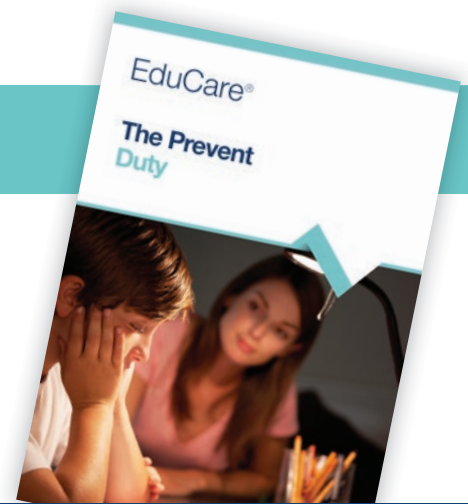


The Prevent Duty

This course provides an insight into the Prevent Duty, covering the essential facts to help you understand what the Prevent Duty is and what you need to do to comply. Course content

- Understand the difference between extremism and radicalisation.
- Learn about the different terrorist threats the UK faces such as Northern Ireland, right wing and Islamist terrorism.
- A look at who may be at risk of being radicalised including information on how young people are radicalised.
- Details on how groups make use of the internet to promote extremist materials, as well as how they use social media to recruit and radicalise individuals.
- A detailed timeline of Safaa Boular, the youngest teenager to be found guilty of planning a terror attack in the UK.
- A look at what Prevent is, and how it aims to reduce the threat of terrorism by stopping people becoming terrorists or supporting terrorism.
- Information on 'The Prevent Duty', which places a duty on specific bodies to have 'due regard to prevent people from being drawn into terrorism'.
- Learn about what is expected of those in leadership positions in specific bodies such as health and social care, criminal justice and all types of schools.
- A look at Prevent referrals and 'Channel', which identifies and provides support to individuals at risk of being radicalised.
- Signs to look out for, what you should do if you have a concern and helpful contacts who can provide additional support.
- A helpful scenario to help you understand how a young person may become radicalised, what emotions they may be experiencing and what you should do.
